## FISHING REPORT

Like before, I'm trying to think of a word to summarize it and once more, that word can very well be "consistency". Having already mentioned "consistency" regarding our early fishing season, well, it is safe to say that the quality of the fishing on the Middle Limay remained highly consistent all season.

Busy as it has been, we were hardly able to notice how quickly the season's gone by. Simply put, this has been a long and steady fishing season including the entire month of April and even May (which is something we were not so used to before we had Limay River Lodge, since it's virtually unique to the Middle Limay River only). Profuse hatches at times with lots of surface action and high effectiveness with attractors and nymphs even when there were no hatches going on. (And streamers, as always, did also great.)

In this sense, the Middle Limay is an exception to the norm, being a tail water fishery it does NOT depend on the runoff or the snow-mass, nor does it get too warm, too cold or too low, since it always offers consistent water flow and temperature.



This is the reason why during the very early season (Nov. - Dec.) while all the other rivers will be high and hard to wade, the Middle Limay will be at its best, offering superb dry fly fishing for large trout as it does throughout the entire season, or maybe better yet. And this is the reason why it fishes great at the end of the season (April, May) too!

This year the west wind has prevailed, with some windy moments that made casting a bit harder but the fish remained active, regardless. Unlike last year, this year's season has had very few days of east Puelche wind. Fishing for resident rainbows and browns measuring 19 to 23 inches and more has been unparalleled fun, yet the migratory browns kept offering us fantastic surprises throughout the entire season. And ours is a truly long season on the Middle Limay: November - May!



All in all, again, this has been a really great season on the Middle Limay. Now we are already thinking of next season and we can't wait!
